## Timeline of Leather Culture in the United States

1940s Motorcycle gangs became all the rage after WWII. A subset of these gangs were formed by homosexual men who had been discharged from the armed forces.

1947 The news media sensationalizes a motorcycle rally in California, calling it the Hollister Riot. This did nothing but fuel the fires of general discontent, bringing motorcycle clubs (and gay leather) into the mainstream,

Five years later, The Wild One brought motorcycle and leather culture to the big screen. Marlon Brando became a symbol of masculine independence in his jeans, T-shirt, and leather jacket and Muir hat.

Chuck Renslow and Dom Orejudos open up Gold Coast, the first gay leather bar, in Chicago, IL. Renslow and Orejudos would later go on to found International Mr. Leather.

1966 Two leather bars on San Francisco's Folsom Street, The Stud and Febe's, open their doors, leading to an influx of bars to the area.

	Women & Leather
1978	Pat Califia, Gayle Rubin, and sixteen other activists co-found Samois, the first lesbian BDSM group in the United States.
1979	Dykes on Bikes led what was then called the San Francisco Gay Freedom Day Parade for the first time. They have led it ever since.
1980	Leather and Lace, a woman's leather/BDSM support and social group, was founded in Los Angeles. The group had a code of conduct and a uniform, worn once a member had earned the right.



James Lee becomes the first person of colour to win the title of International Mr. Leather.

One year later, Jack Thompson becomes the first trans person of colour to win the International Mr. Leather.
